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#### ROCKCASTLE COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL SEATBELT SAFETY CAMPAIGN

The Rockcastle County Health Center is sponsoring a seatbelt safety campaign.

A seatbelt survey was conducted at the high school on March 5, 2001. The survey results showed that of 232 students viewed as they were leaving school, 76% were not wearing seatbelts.

### WHY SHOULD YOU WEAR SEATBELT?

- Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children of every age from 5-18 years old.
- For young drivers (ages 15-18) involved in fatal crashes, 43% were not using a seat belt; among those who were killed, 59% were not using a seatbelt.
- . Lap/shoulder belts, when used, reduce the risk of fatal injury to front seat passenger car occupants by 45% and the risk of moderate-to-critical injury by 50%.
- The fatality rate for young drivers (16-19 years old) is about four times as high as the rate for drivers aged 25-69.

Can the Rockcastle County High School drivers beat the Jackson County High School drivers?

We did the same seathelt survey in Jackson County on March 13th and 68% of their drivers viewed did not have their seatbelts on! Jackson County had 8% more students wearing their seatbelts.
