Quail man killed in wreck

A Rockcastle man was killed in a single vehicle accident on Hwy. 70 Thursday afternoon. Monroe Brown, 68, of Quail, died at the scene from massive trauma, after the four-wheel drive truck he was driving landed on him, according to Rockcastle County Coroner

Freddic Cromer of Town and Country Chevron.helped in the effort to remove Bradley, away from the tree with the cable on his wrecker. The accident occurred at 3 p.m. Wednesday affernoon.

PRIDE (Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment) announced Wednesday that it has awarded \$11.540 in grants this school year targeted at helping Rockeastle County educators teach school children and adults more about their environment and how to protect it.

PRIDE will award a total of 109

construction of 173 outdoor classrooms, 19 nature trails, the imple-mentation of 20 school recycling projects, the purchase of various re-sources for classrooms and other projects at schools throughout the 40-county region PRIDE serves.

"The Chemical Stockpile Emer-gency Response Plan is a vital standby in case of an unexpected chemical release at the Blue Grass Army Depot. Each of the public fa-cilities (including schools and hos-pitals) has a plan designated by the state director in cases far a general pitals) has a plan designated by the state director in case of an emergency. In addition, the plan relies heavily upon the coordination of emergency services by the local fire departments and law enforcement of the coordination of the coordinatio

Protective Area Zone (PAZ). Northern Rockcastle County is one of those in a PAZ.

"According to all computer generated scenarios, Rockcastle and Garrard counties are perhaps at the least risk for chemical contamination. This is because wind direction would have to change from normal flow at

have to change from normal flow at the actual time of an emergency be-fore Rockcastle's PAZ would be af-fected," he said.

"In case of an emergency declared by the governor or other authorities, residents in the PAZ are to remove from their homes to the Rockcastle County, Middle School, which is
