## 911 board hears complaints from county firefighters

A large crowd, mostly county inferfighers attended Thursday night's monthly 911 board meeting to voice their vencerns about 911.

Livingston fire chief Sam Stallsworth and Mr. Vermon fire chief Garry Hansel were the most vocal two in the crowd. Both men said that 911 needed two dispatchers on duty at all times, because of the number of transmissions made each day, especially during a stall worth even called for the firing of dispatcher Jamie Alcorn firing of dispatcher Jamie Alcorn

Stallsworth told 911 board chair-man Harry Harmon and 911 Director Bonnie Roark, that Alcorn had told a lie on fim during January 15th of the on firm during January 15th of the word of the thing the stall of the fire in which Livingston was called to ad Mt. Vernon at a fire in Johnetta.

"Quite frankly I want him fired," Stallsworth said.

"He got on the radio and said that I was still in the bod, when I had already gotten the fire truck and went-to the fire - he even said he called my house which is a hald faced lie, Stallsworth said.

Roark said Tuesday that she had istened to the tapes of that day's radio transmissions and could find nothing concerning what Stallsworth-asa talking about, but that she would continue to investigate the matter until it was resolved.

As for two dispatchers on duy at all times, Roark said that 911 was losing about \$1,000 a month at the present time and there was not enough money available to keep two dispatchers of duy.

money available to keep two dis-patchers for duty.

The local 911-board receives ap-proximately \$13,000 from local resi-dents who pay a \$2,00 monthly fee on each phone line in the county.

Harmon told the crowd that ev-eryone needed to work together to make 911 work as smoothly as pos-sible.

wake 911 work as smoothly as pos-sible.

We all make mistakes and when things like this are called to our atten-tion we will try to correct any errors in the system, 'Harmond said.

Harmon, who has been a board member since 911 was implemented in the county is Director of the Rockcastle County Ambulañce Ser-vice.

stallsworth and Hansel, as well as other firefighters also complained about the directions they were given to fires by dispatchers.

The men said the directions were

often very inaccurate and incomplete and it made it difficult to find a fire or

give out wrong directions on pur-pose," Roark told the firefighters.
"It is very hectic at 911 many times and there are some callers who will tell you to go to the big rock by the road or they will say - Harry the road or they will say - Harry knows where it is, he has been here before - but Harry isn't always work-
