1. Do make certain that children maintain quality contact with each parent (providing that there is no abuse or neglect involved). Research shows that children who keep contact with both parents adjust best to divorce.

2. Do sit down with your kids as a couple and let them know that you both love them, will both remain their parents, and that the divorce is not their fault.

3. Do find a way to communicate

with your ex which minimizes the chance of negativity. If you can't talk to each other, how about e-mail?

4. Don't communicate with your exthrough your kids.

5. Don't demean or criticize your ext to your kids.

6. Do ask your relatives and friends to abide by the same "no bashing of the ex in front of the kids" rule.

8. Don't react inappropriately to things you see in your kids which remind you of your ex. "You are just like your father!" is usually not a helpful comment.
