To apply for SIP benefits producers thust have more than 10 acres of nonindustrial forest land. The program includes cuts share for establishing or regetablishing stands of trees through planning or direct-seeding of trees for conservation and satisfanche in the production, forest improvement and to maintain or improve water quality and soil production. rove water quality and soil produc vity on forest land to restore wet
