At the new Babe Ruth field in Brodhead, the physical court showed great concern for our youth by agreeing to help pay off the lights, and this gesture was also greatly appreciated; however, Little League records show this was only a small part of the total project.

The young girls of the county should have been provided a recreational facility where they could practice and play.

In closing, I would like to compliment the maintenance people at the courthouse for the wonderful job they do keeping the courthouse clean. Knowing these people, I don't think the judge has to force them to do such a good job.
