Brodhead council upset with former officer's actions

The Brodhead City Council and Mayor Walter Cash are none too happy with a former police officer.

Former officer William H. Harris, Jr., was hired in June 2001 and resigned on May 1st.,

The problem is that Harris signed a contract to work for the city for three yearsafter hecompleted his required training at Eastern Kentucky University. Harris apparently gave the city and Chief Joe Bussell no advance warning of his resignation.

Bussell told the council on Monday night that Harris had gone to work for ecity of Livingston, but that he had been in Brodhead with police officers since his departure.

The council instructed City Autorney John Ford to begin the process of collecting what the city is owed from Harris.

Ford said that if Harris was now willing to live up to his signed contract he would file suit within the next ten days.

Applications for paper absentee suntons we not may be received in Rockcastle County Clerk Normal Houk's office by May 21st at 4:00 p.m. Paper absentee ballots are for those persons who are disabled, or for college students living outside of the county or for those on military duty, according to Mrs. Houk.

These applications can be made by phone, fax, mail or in person and be requested by the voter or a spouse, parent or child of the voter.

Absentee voting for voters who will be absent from the county on election day but are not allowed to vote by paper absentee ballots will be conducted in the county clerk's office now through Friday May 24th.

The hours for voting will be Monday through Friday 8:30 a.m. till 4:00 p.m. and on Saturday from 8:30 a.m. till 12 noon, according to Mrs. Houx.

Donald Hellard was apparently renting the mobile home to Mullins. All ear currently being held in the Rockcastle County Detention Center for a \$50,000 cash bond.


Baccalaureate set for Sunday, 2:30
