Sudden death is, by definition, an event for which we are unprepared. Unlike the death of someone very old, or someone with a terminal illness, it is a death which has not been anticipated and is often quite difficult to accept.

When a family is faced with a sudden accidental death, it can be very helpful if they are able to view the body. In spite of serious injuries and damage, it is very often possible to prepare the body in an acceptable

fashien so that the family can view
the loved one in order to face the reality of the death.
On the other hand, if the victim of
a sudden death is kept from view, it
can cause a lot of psychological problems for the survivors. As clinical
data has demonstrated, preventing the
family from secting the body can keep
them in the stage of denial for years
to come, and prevent them from accepting their loss.
