One month left to apply for assistance because of storms

The Federal Emergency-Management Agency (FEMA) will accept applications through July 8 for those in the 32 disaster-designated couries.-The deadline for submitting loan applications to the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) for flood-related losses to real and personal property is July 6.

"We want people to understand that these are applications deadlines," said Mike Bolch of FEMA, the federal coordinating officer. "The requests of individuals who have al-

ready applied will continue to be pro-cessed. But by law we can't accept any new applications after the July 8 date."

Because fiscal years end on June 30, Executive Director Bige Towery of the Rockeastle County Development Board and Chairman John Cloutz of the Industrial Development, Authority gave an update to the fiscal court's magistrates on the status of development potential in the country.

Clentz and Towery spoke of the work that has been conducted by several Development Board Task Forces that have been meeting on a regular basis on everything from garbage collection and beautification to education and business/job creation. Their report suggests that more activity has been generated by these working groups than perhaps ever in the past. A notable accomplishment expected to be delivered in Written form to the fiscal court in October or November will be the Rockesstle County Long-Range Community Comprehensive Development Plan, which has been in the works for a couple of years and will be the result of community meetings that were lead at the high school, the city halls couple of years and will be the result of community meetings that were held at the high school, the city halls and the courthouse and that were attended by hundreds of citzens.

Meetings are still being held toward this effort. One of the major results of having such a comprehensive plan for Rockcastle County will

be the increased acceptance to all the communities "requests made to the state and federal government funding sources," according to Towery.
