This fall there will be races in each town for Mayor and council members and there will also be races in two of the five school board divi-



Boil water advisory issued for part of city

Water Superintendent Dennis McClure said that a sample taken from an outside faucet at one of the bomes in the area, tested positive for the E, Coll virus.

Four plead guilty in **U.S. Federal Court**
