God bless you all in my prayer.

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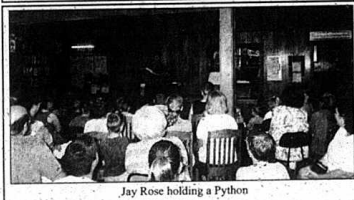

The Wilburns at Northside Baptist Church July 1-3

More than 30 years ago, a young couple from Carthage, Tennessee, sang a song during a revival service at their local church. The song they sang that night has long been forgotten, but its strains live on, for the ministry continues to bless lives around the country.

Jackie and Elaine Wilburn created what has become one of the most sought-after groups in Southern Gospel music.

It started as a duet, but as the family grew, so did the group. In the '70s and '80s, Jackie and Elaine, sons Jimmy, Jay and Jonathan, daughter-in-law, Kathy and grandson, Jim traveled all over the Southeast, perfecting the Wilburns' family-style gospel music.

After undergoing their first major change into a trio of Jackie, Elaine and Jonathan in 1986, the Wilburns began receiving national attention in the early '90s with songs like "God's Promised Land", "Outside the Gate" and "When Dust Shall Sing." These songs solidified the Wilburns' sound and began a long list of chart-topping songs that continues to this day.

In 1996, the Wilburns' son Jonathan left to sing for Gold City, one of gospel music's most popular male quartets.

Over the years, several talented people have used their abilities in the Wilburns' ministry. Among them are Tony Gore, Tony Peace, Loren Harris and Ricky Atkinson, who wrote the Wilburns' #1 song "Resting Place."

God continues to bless the Wilburns with singers and musicians who can showcase their talents while remaining true to the group's sound. Elaine says that after a few changes in recent years, the Wilburns have "the finest group we could ever ask for." With songs like "Singing in the Heavenly Chorus", "Resting Place" and "Out of the Dust and Into the Clouds," the group is going stronger than ever. Elaine is quick to add, "We are happy to have along with us three very fine individuals who have a heart for the ministry."

"Jimmy has one of the strongest

lead voices to come along in a long time," says Elaine. "He brings to the Wilburns years of experience and a marvelous attitude of worship. He is also a wonderful songwriter."

Singing tenor is Gary Casto of Hendersonville, Tennessee.

"Not only is Gary a good singer," Jackie says, "he also helps organize

other aspects of the work."

Then there's Josh Singletary on the piano - a 20-year-old from Raiford, Florida. He was classically trained for 12 years, but Elaine says, "his heart led him to Southern Gospel, and we are so glad! His red hair only draws attention to a marvelously talented young man."

This group has brought a youthful excitement to the Wilburns. Jackie and Elaine are looking forward to the future as never before. Their latest releases include "That's My Boy," "Moved Up, Moved Out, Moved On" and "We Will Stand."

Whether it's a lively camp meeting, a Saturday night concert or a Sunday worship service, the Wilburns will provide just the right songs delivered with style and conviction for a program that will make an everlasting impact on the audience.

The Wilburns will be in Revival at the Northside Baptist Church from July 1-3 at 7 p.m. nightly. The Wilburns will be singing nightly and Bro. Jackie Wilburn will be the Evangelist. Bro. Chad Burdette and the church welcomes everyone.

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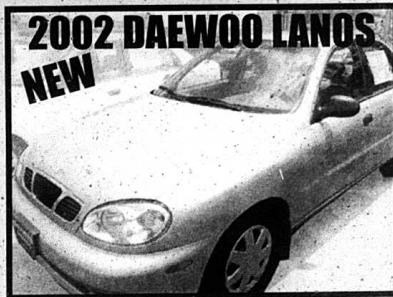
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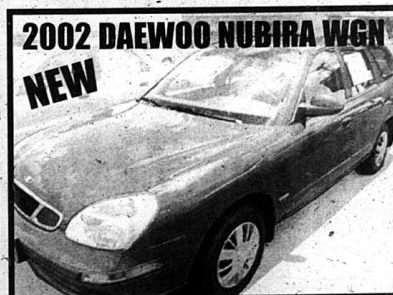
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
