No sir, both NASCAR and the feams need the money too badly. The big boys at NASCAR know which side of their bread the jelly is on.

I don't think Mike Helton, their top dawg, really wants to strip any-one of a win or points, because of the uproar it would cause. He knows there are only so many American companies right now that can shell out \$10-15 million to sponsor a race

The sport of stock car racing needs those big corporate dollars. Without the big bucks, NASCAR would wither faster than a watermelon on the vine on a host societing lays. It would be a lose-lose situation for both NASCAR and the spensor. There's just too much money, prestige, and bragging rights for it to happen.

When I was a boy growing up, 1 had a tendency to say and do things that were better left alone. Until I was about I 2 years old, my grandmother lived with us. Growing up in rural Lowndes County, Ala-bama in the late 1800s, before women were liberated, she hid her sauff-dipping habit from, most out-siders. One day our local Baptisi preacher came to visit. Grandma, Jackson, who was sitting in her rocker in the living room, made a dash for the bathroom faster than any NFL tailback ever went into the end zone.
