Drug court program receives funding

The Administrative Office of the ourts, Drug Courts Department has en awarded Edward Byrne Memorial grant monies totaling \$867,958 from the Kentucky Justice Cabinet to

fund the continuation of drug courts.
A letter from Governor Paul E.
Patton stated, "Protecting the life and
property of the Commonwealth of
Kentucky's citizens is the foremost
responsibility of government. Because of this obligation, my admisistration is particularly sensitive to
the needs of the criminal justice sys-

us," he added.
Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert
oversees Kentucky's drug courts.
"The citizens of Kentucky will be
well served by this continuing commitment to the justice system. With
additional funds available for auditional funds available for Kentucky's drug courts, we can con-tinue working to break the cycle of drug addiction that is at the root of many of society's problems," said Lambert.


