This must be on the current Kentucky form and done since August, 2001. Students participating in any sport will be

required to turn in a separate athletic physical form. This must be on a Kentucky form, Incoming 6th Immunization:

graders are required to have a 2nd MMR and 3 doses of Hepatitis-B. The document must be signed, dated, and have an expiration date.

The physical and immunization certificate are required the day the student enrolls for school. However, an appointment card showing that the student is scheduled for a physical in August is acceptable.

Please bring these to RCMS Orientation on August 8 (6:00 - 8:00) or turn in the first day of school, August 15.
