The West Nile Virus (WNV); ansmitted by the bite of certain transmitted by the bite of certain types of mosquitoes, may cause those people who contact the virus to be-come ill

Most human WNV infections Most human WNV infections cause either no symptoms or mild flu-like illness. As with many illness, those people with compromised im-nune systems can experience a more severe reaction. The incubation time-from the bite and clinical symptoms-can range from three to 14 days. Only two types of mosquitoes, out of a to-tal. of 52 different types, carry the WNV.

I. Since standing water is a prime breeding medium of mosquitoes, prevent stagnant water in animal watering troughs, dishes, etc. by changing it every few days.
