The next time you call 911 or any police agency, think about this before you curse at the dispatcher on duty. Your life may depend on their reac-tions and quick thinking.

The first person you talk to is a dispatcher. Because callers depend on dispatchers to send help quickly, it is a very stressful and mostly thankles job. We work every heliday and most weekends, and the pay isn't the best. Not only do we have to deal with every type of problem imaginable, we also have to worny about getting imergency personnel to and from a call safely. There is a lot of stress knowing that so much depends on our decisions and how quickly we make them.
