The Jayvees are a perfect 4 for 4 in their last outings, defeating Oneida 15-3 and 15-0; Monticello 15-7 and 15-3; Wayne Co. 15-13 and 15-4 and the best of all, beating North Laurel two of three, 16-18, 16-14 and 15-4.

Against Oneida, Krystal Parsons put across 10 straight service points to begin the second game and garnered 12 service win points for the match, including 7 aces. Allie Mink also served up 12 winners with 3 aces. Jeni Durham and Trisha Beth Lawwell and 2 winners each and Janelle Jones and Kayla Bryant got 1 each.

Mink served 8 winners in a row to finish the first game against Monticello on her way to getting 11 service winners in the match with 5 aces. Krystal Parsons served 8 straight points to begin the second game with 9 for the match and 5 aces. Durham was 6 and 3; Bryant 3 and 2 and Megan Andierkin 1 for 1.

Arrangements are by Cox Funeral Home and are incomplete at this time.

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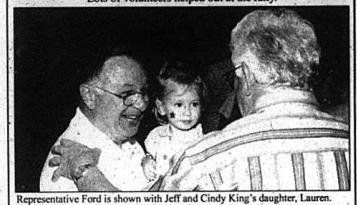
Approximately 600 people attended State Representative Danny Ford's political rally held at Rockcastle County Middle School last Friday.
