Kirby - Tucker



CHICKEN AND **DUMPLINGS**

1 large chicken 2 cups flour

1/2 teaspoon baking pow-1/2 teaspoon salt

1 egg, beaten

3 tablespoons shortening, melted 1/3 to 1/2 cup water or chicken broth

Place chicken in a large pot. Cover with water. Bring to a boil. Cover and reduce heat so water gently simmers. Cook for one hour or until chicken is tender and falling off bone. When done, remove from broth and let cool. Remove skin and debone when cool enough to handle.

In large bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. Add beaten egg, shortening and liquid. Divide into 3 parts. Roll out very thin. Cut in small strips; drop into broth. Cook dumplings until tender. If desired add chicken to stock and dumplings until

Circuit Clerk's office celebrates Donate Life Month in April

"This April and every day, I am proud of the impact this office has on the lives of others, especially those in need of life-saving organ transplants. I> am humbled at the generosity of our community," says Rockcastle Co, Circuit Clerk Eliza Jane York. "Even through tough economic times, our community is committed to helping others."

The Circuit Court Clerk's office plays a vital role in helping patients in need. With nearly 1000 Kentuckians on the waiting list for an organ transplant, the need is greater than ever. The driver's license clerks ask every person obtaining a license or ID to donate a \$1 to the Kentucky Organ Donor Program and, if they wish to be a registered organ donor. "I am honored to an-

nounce that in 2012, 425 Rockcastle County residents gave hope to patients in need by becoming registered organ donors," York said.

Out of 3828 licenses issued last year, the Rockcastle County driver's license staff collected \$2257 to help the Circuit Clerk's organ donor awareness program. These dollar donations go to a separate nonprofit called the Trust For Life. With these funds, the Trust educates Kentucky about the life-saving mission of organ donation through community outreach programs, public speaking and advertising

Each day, 18 people die while awaiting a life-saving organ transplant. The Circuit Clerk's office, and the dediresidents Rockcastle County are working to end the wait and save more lives. As of January 2013, Kentuckians who renew their license can have a blue organ donor heart printed on their ID.

'Every heart we print gives hope to patients in need. We hope everyone will understand that you no longer have to sign the back of your license or use an orange dot. Simply say Yes when you renew your ID to add your name to the confidential Kentucky Organ Donor Registry," York ex-

Any adult Kentucky resident can join the Kentucky Organ Donor Registry at their Circuit Court Clerk's office or online at www.donatelifeky.org. Any Rockcastle County person touched by the mission of organ donation is encouraged to tell their Gift of Life story through the Trust For Life www.trustforlife.org.

Recycling Center Is Now Open!!!

The Rockcastle County Recycling Center is located at 2528 South Wilderness Rd (US 25 South) next to the Rockcastle County Road Department Garage and is open Monday thru Friday from 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. (closed on major holidays).

The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, catalogs, office paper, junk mail, shredded paper, books, phone books, cardboard (corrugated and slick), plastics #1-7, plastic grocery store bags, metal cans, aerosol cans, aluminum cans, aluminum foil, aluminum pie plates, glass bottles and glass jars, old cell phones, car batteries, empty printer and toner cartridges, old computers and all related accessories, telephones, radios, digital clocks, televisions, rechargeable batteries (if the battery says rechargeable on it, then it is recyclable), and large bulky metal items. Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department.
